We do all of this with integrity, respect, care, belief and co-operation – our Scout Laws.


# Improving well-being throughout life

Scouting is making our world a better place, improving well-being and life chances

### Just a few examples ... Scouts are:

- 6% higher on **happiness**
- 6% more likely to have increased **perseverance** and **grit**
- 6% more likely to play an **active role** in their **community**
- 10% higher scoring in getting along well with people of **different races, cultures, & religions**
- 12% more likely to show **leadership** by taking **initiative** and acting as a **role model** to help others make a positive difference
- 17% more likely to value the outdoors
- 19% more **independent**

## A New Hut — benefits we will 300 in the building

- **Sustainable features:** solar panels, insulation, ventilation, double glazing, air source heat pump
- Energy efficient: light, heat & hot water
- Water efficient: taps, toilets, flow, water meter
- **High standards of accessibility** inside and out: step-free, toilet
- More attractive, improved street scene

- More natural daylight
- Improved equipment storage
- Maximised, flexible indoor and outdoor space
- Outdoor canopy for shelter
- Larger, double kitchen
- Outside sink
- Increased interior height for physical activities

# **Benefits we will feel from the building**



#### Q&A Summary

Following our presentation to Parish councillors on 5th March 2023, the tour of the building and discussion of the plans raised a number of points which were clarified.

#### Storage & safeguarding

While larger, more efficient, safer storage has clear practical benefits, it goes far beyond a 'nice to have'. Leader Christian Leigh explained an example of the problems of accessing the current storage during a session. You can't go to the external storage and leave one leader alone with young people. You can't take young people with you to help because you will be out of sight of the other leader and be alone with young people. The only solution is to have everything you need ready before a session which is stressful and difficult to achieve, inhibits the young people getting involving in helping, and prevents adaptation to the needs or interests of the young people as a session unfolds. The reconfiguration includes access from inside the building which solves these problems.

#### Reconfigured windows, folding doors and inside/outside space

These features benefit the light and space of the building, but they have very significant benefits for the safety of young people and for the ease of running successful sessions. Currently, it is impossible to observe anyone or anything outside through the high-level windows. Activity must be indoors or out, and it is difficult to switch between the two because of supervision and safeguarding issues. The folding doors will mean that the outdoor and indoor space can be combined for a variety of activity so that sessions can maximise the use of the available space while maintaining the highest levels of supervision and safeguarding standards.

#### Use of the hut by other community organisations

A question was raised as to whether the Hut would be open for rental by other community organisations. We would welcome requests from the community to book the Hut for ad hoc needs, however regular rental is incompatible with our use. It was explained that other than the time spent in sessions with the young people, the Hut is also regularly needed in the daytime by volunteers for a wide variety of tasks.

Examples of this include:

- Volunteers preparing for a camp or activity means laying out, checking and servicing equipment e.g. sorting and labelling tent poles.
- After a camp tents must be hung out to dry from ropes that span the hut.
- Preparing for bike sales mean the hut is full of bikes during days in which volunteers are servicing, organising, photographing and listing bikes for sale.
